

# Alison Saunders

## Toxic Feminist of the Month



J4MB presents [Alison Saunders](#), Director of Public Prosecutions since November 2013, with its **Toxic Feminist of the Month** award for February 2016.

The anti-male bias of the Crown Prosecution Service has become even stronger under Ms Saunders's stewardship, than it had been historically. Three months after her appointment, Ms Saunders was interviewed by Laura Kuenssberg for BBC *Newsnight* – [here](#). We recommend you read the description under the video before watching it. Her espousal of radical feminist narratives on sexual assaults of women has never been in doubt. We cannot recall her talking about sexual assaults of women by women, or sexual assaults of men or children by women. We know that around a quarter of sexual assaults of opposite-sex adults are carried out by women, as detailed in our 2015 general election [manifesto](#) (pp.31-7). The criminal justice system in general, and the CPS in particular, takes virtually no interest in women's sexual abuse of men, women, or children.

So desperate have the police and CPS been to pursue men suspected of sexual assaults, that we recently had a surreal case of a 51-year-old man (Mark Pearson) charged with sexually assaulting a 60-something actress in a train station while the two of them were walking in opposite directions, and he was holding onto a bag with one hand, and a newspaper with the other. The CCTV footage had been tampered with in an effort to deceive the defence team and jury into thinking the period of time during which the two were close, was higher than it actually was. There is no proof the two even touched one another. The man's life has been severely damaged – he has suffered from panic attacks, and contemplated suicide – while the actress remains anonymous. It hasn't even been suggested she might be charged with perverting the course of justice.

In September 2015 we sent a Freedom of Information Act request – [here](#) – to Ms Saunders, requesting minutes of meetings in which representatives of named feminist organizations working in the area of domestic violence had been present. Her answer is almost 20 weeks overdue.

The CPS does not prosecute those carrying out male genital mutilation in the UK, despite knowing the procedure is unquestionably illegal.

The CPS does not prosecute women suspected of paternity fraud, even when evidence from paternity tests proves beyond any doubt that the women committed fraud.
