David, far from misogynists being 'by no means the majority' in the MRM, they are a tiny proportion. The MRM is not a welcoming place for misogynists, with good reason.

I never cease to marvel at how men can be treated viciously by women - domestic violence, false rape allegations, financial ruin through divorce, other manifestations - yet not become misogynists as a result.

In stark contrast, many women and most feminists are misandrous - the more radical in their feminism, the more misandrous they are. Feminists stoke misandry by increasing women's fear of men as a class, which leads women to hate men as a class. It's cynical and cruel, and the true purpose is to keep otherwise unemployable professional feminists in employment in grievance-mongering industries, including academia and the media.

Yes David, I have come across genuine misogyny occasionally too, although very little within MRA communities - probably less than within feminist groups ironically, where derogatory portrayals of women as eternally infantile and pathetic sometimes emerge. Misandry however is indistinguishable from feminism today. The core narratives and concepts of feminism are essentially misandrist, as are their actions and campaign goals. There is certainly a debate to be had about what is strategically the best approach when trying to convince the 'undecideds', as you discuss in your post below ie what attitude we display publicly.
